

 Augustine. OR Aquinas, OR Luther, OR Ibn Rushd, OR
 - Ibn Tufayl, OR Ibn Khaldun.
- 3. Conclude by stating clearly the effects of this quotation on our human relations.

OR II INTERPRETATION

"They have no right to interpret Scripture merely by authority and without learning." (Luther, p.11).

- 1. Analyze critically the underlying bases that led Luther to this conclusion with a brief discussion of the alternative recommended.
- 2. React to the above quotation from the point of view of Ibn Rushd OR Thomas Aquinas.
- 3. Do not forget to specify, in each case, who the "they" are, and what "authority" and "learning" stand for.
- 4. Evaluate and state your OWN opinion.

- 1. Identify clearly but briefly the reasons that led Luther to this conclusion, and his recommended solution.
- Would Machiavelli approve of Luther's solution and recommend it to his "prince"? Why or why not?

- 1. Analyze briefly and critically each reference to the dreams (within its context), by examining why and what for the dreams are referred to by TWO (2) of the following authors:

 (a) Al-Ghazali, (b) Dante, (c) Ibn Khaldun.
- 2. Comment comparatively on the role and function assigned to this human phenomenon of dreams (and its interpretation).
- 3. State your OWN opinion (attitude) concerning dreams.
