- 2. Both Machiavelli (in <u>The Prince</u>) and Ibn Khaldun (mimeo. selection) in the form of a letter written by an army general to his son during the reign of Al-Ma'mun outline the desirable and necessary characteristics in any leader for long and effective rule. Discuss the major similarities and differences between the two political models by referring to their unique premises and goals.
- 3. Having stressed the limitations of human reasoning, many theological philosophers/poets settled for other means of perceiving God. Why is it difficult, if not impossible, to "see" God? Where and how may He be appreciated by the common man? Choose 1 Christian and 1 Muslim thinker who specified alternative ways for living in divine grace.
