EXPLANATION AND JUSTIFICATION

very essential that you back up any central statements you make in presenting the ideas of the authors in question, and more importantly in your critical evaluation of those ideas.

<u>RELEVANCE</u>: it is essential that you present ideas and arguments relevant to the questions asked. Going into irrelevant discussion is a waste of your valuable time; it could also cause the reader (yours truly) to lose sight of the relevant discussions you present.

<u>CRITICAL THINKING</u>: this is most important in terms of your critical evaluation discussions; critical thinking, and not simply agreeing or
