Education Overview: Access to elementary and secondary schools is universal throughout the country; however, the quality varies significantly between the urban and rural sectors; the urban schools are better equipped and teachers salaries are significantly higher. The state mandated curriculum for public schools reflects the traditional British style, private schools are free to develop their own curriculum. Fifteen technical schools are spread across the two largest urban areas. There are two large public universities and 15 private colleges and universities; entrance is extremely competitive and bribery has been known to occur to gain entrance into all institutions

Economic Overview This is a middle-income market with an abundant supply of natural resources: well-developed financial, legal, communications (best developed telephone system on the continent), energy, and transport sectors; a stock exchange that ranks among the 10 largest in the world; and a modern infrastructure supporting an efficient distribution of goods to major urban centers throughout the region. However, growth has not been strong enough to lower its high unemployment rate; daunting economic problems remain from its past history of racial segregation especially poverty and lack of economic empowerment among the disadvantaged groups.
