3. BRUTUS.

PART TWO (70%): Choose TWO of the topics below. In each case write a well-organized, well-developed essay. Make as many specific references to the discussed text(s) as you can. Devote 40 minutes to each topic.

- 1. Compare and contrast Shakespeare's use of storms in <u>King Lear</u>, <u>Macbeth</u>, <u>Julius Caesar</u> and <u>The Tempest</u>.
- 2. Explore the character of Antony in <u>Julius Caesar</u>. What are his strengths? His weakness? Is he a fit leader?
- 3. Compare and contrast the characters of Bianca and Katherina in <u>The Taming of the Shrew.</u>
- 4. Explore Shakespeare's treatment of conscience in Macbeth and King Lear.
- 5. What are the similarities and differences between Fortinbras, Horatio and Leartes in Hamlet?
