


## Test Questions for the Final Exam

- 1. More than 20 years after its publication, what are the strengths and weaknesses of Garreau's "Nine Nations" hypothesis?
- 2. To what extent is the Federal Rectangular Survey System an expression of U.S. culture and society and to what extent has it shaped them?
- 3. Why do events of the "1960s" loom so large in the debates that demarcate U.S. political divisions today?
- 4. According to Cronon, what is "the trouble with wilderness"? If his thesis is correct, what does this imply about what can be done to repair the "trouble"? Does it have public policy implications? To what extent do you think he is right, and why?
- 5. Consider the two following maps: African-American population, and Hispanic-American population. How can the two distributions be explained (why are they where they are today?)? In comparing the two patterns, why are they so different?
