- I. Choose 5 of the following questions and write one paragraph (only) around these questions (60%)
- 1. In what way is Kant's moral philosophy still relevant, meaningful, to us to-day?
- 2. What does it mean to be <u>enlightened</u> according to Kant? Are we enlightened to-day at AUB and in Beirut/Lebanon? Explain what you mean whether you think we are or we are not enlightened.
- 3. We started our course by talking about the <u>Scientific Revolution</u> (16th and 17th centuries in Europe). State a few najor elements that shaped up this Revolution.
- 4. Descartes wondered "How do I Know"? and "How can I be certain about what I know"? Was he able to answer these basic questions and in what manner?
- 5. How does John Locke solve the problem of the misuse of political power in his Second Treatise of Government?
- 6. In what way did Adam Smith's <u>economic liberalism</u> aim at securing the basic rights of individuals in society? What are these basic rights according to Smith?
- 7. What are these rights (see question number 6) according to Karl Marx? Which political system would preserve them?
- 8. Faust signs the compact with Mephisto in Goethe's play and tells the devil:

 If ever I lie down in sloth and base in action,

 Then let that moment be my end.

 Analyze it.
