  - (g) Kant.
- 2. Be sure to clarify, in each case, the <u>specific</u> institutions and/or laws each author is defending and/or attacking.
- 3. Evaluate critically and state your OWN opinion.

#### OR II. "BEYOND GOOD AND EVIL"?

"That which is done out of love always takes place beyond good and evil". (Nietzsche, Aphorism 153, p. 103)

- 1. Elaborate the consequences of the above quotation on the concept of man and the "value system" within the overall Nietzschean context. (Briefly)
- 2. Comment on one of the following murders (deaths) in the light of the above quotation.
  - (a) Jean Morris: from the point of view of Mustafa Sa'eed **OR** Prof. Maxwell Foster-Keen.
  - (b) Wad Rayyes: from the point of view of Hosna OR Mahjoub OR the narrator.
  - (c) Gretchen (Faust).(Do not forget to state clearly how your analysis relates to Nietzsche's aphorism).
- 3. Conclude and state your OWN opinion.

1. Why? Analyze very briefly. Is there a remedy recommended? Specify.

2. Respond to the above on the basis of ONE concrete example from Nietzsche, OR Freud, OR Tayeb Saleh, OR Marx.

## OR IV. IN THIS IMMENSE CONFUSION ONE THING ALONE IS CLEAR..." (Beckett)


