Please choose **two** of the following four tasks. For each task, you need to select **two** texts. You may use Márquez, if you wish, twice (but not the same story) for the same or both questions. The remaining 2 or 3 authors have to be different. Please select carefully all four texts before you respond to the two tasks you have chosen.

Try to develop a **cogent and original argument** which you then present in an introduction, a body, and a conclusion.

- 1. "Home is Where the Heart Is". How does this saying apply to two traveling characters? Define "home" in relation to "heart" and 'homeland' in two texts.
- 2. Fear of the unknown grips the heart of many travelers we have seen. How is such fear a self-preserving and/or a self-crippling force in two texts?
- 3. For some 'writers' we have seen, the road is a metaphor for life's journey as well as a line (straight or otherwise) to draw on paper and thus visualize this journey. Discuss the visual aspect of life-as-motion in two texts.
- 4. Does travel reinforce or help dispel stereotypes held about 'other' cultures and peoples? Discuss two similar or contrasting experiences from two texts.
